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MEET A MENTOR

To provide for ourselves, we rely on farming and selling fruits such as mangoes and guavas by the roadside. I have a two year old child named Mzothule. I completed my A Levels but was unable to carry on to university because of the expense.

I was introduced to EAGLE by my church youth leader. After working with the children for a few sessions, I realised that I loved it! Nombulelo and Lisbeth are two of my students who consistently impress me. They are always punctual, lighten the mood, and never miss a session. Another learner, Previous, was a reserved student, but as a result of the training I have received this year, I have learnt how to help her come out of her shell.

I walk for three hours to reach the Mablauwni learning group, and in time I would love to open a group closer to my home. I understand the difficulties that these learners go through to get to the nearest school. My goal over the next six months is to attract



more students to the group and confidently mentor them. I hope that my students will grow academically, socially and spiritually.
